Attached you will find summer work for your child to complete over the summer. All the work suggested will be a review of Kindergarten readiness skills. None of the work is mandatory, however, it is strongly recommended and encouraged that students participate.

I recommend students read for 20 minutes daily to continue to foster their reading skills. The 20 minutes of reading can be completed by reading with a parent, family member, or independently.



I am also including choice boards that are grids of math and reading activities to complete over the summer so that your child can continue to practice what they already know. Choice boards are due by September 4th.
